**Lou Henckel was also impacted by mentors in his career and shared stories when we celebrated his retirement last month.**

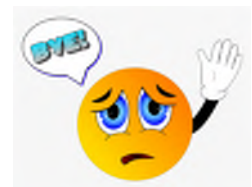
He learned many carpentry skills from Mike Jenkins and a strong work ethic.

### CSA Work

Work continues on Intel’s Hedgehog project in Rio Rancho. **Rob Ridenour**, **Juan Hernandez**, and the structural crew have finished their work on the PCD Room and the BGW Pit. They have also completed most of the self-performed structural work on the TIPS Shell at the time of this writing. Remaining is the structural floor deck and grating for TIPS, the canopy, and the loading dock apron at TIPS.

Klinger’s TIPS scope should conclude sometime in early Q1 2023. Thanks to **Sergio Reynosa**, **Rufino Urquidi**, **Abel Marquez**, **Gregorio Franco**, **Erasm Medina**, **Antonio Loya**, **Tim Bland**, **Manuel Rojo**, **Johel Duran-Morales**, **Salomon Cordero**, **Nathan Francisco**, **Frank Shaw**, **David Horvath**, **Ryan Direen**, **Juan Rivera**, **Marcos Shaw**, and **Raymond Martinez**.

Moving upstairs to the LOD Roof Steel project, all of the stub columns, roofing, and fireproofing have been completed. Alstate has delivered all of the fabricated steel to JTC for blast/paint, and thus begins the process of assembly, sequencing, shipping, and erection in the field. This will take awhile, as Klinger will be working with JB Henderson as they load the finished modules with duct and insulation before they get swung to the roof. Klinger expects a finish date sometime in late Q1 of 2023.

### Electrical Work

Klinger’s electrical crew continues its efforts to support Intel’s Hedgehog project. The scope of the work has expanded significantly in the PCD



Room, and that remains the focus of the largest part of our crew. The crew also has ongoing work in the Fab 9 area, but is looking for new projects that they can start in early 2023.

## Intel Hedgehog for Sundt

Klinger crews have kept up with the relentless pace of construction at Intel’s site working for Sundt as a concrete and earthwork contractor. We have completed projects in and around Fab 9 as the Hedgehog project requires. Projects include extensive demolition, the creation of many trenches, foundations, and equipment pads, even the building of the engineered crane pad for the massive 1700 ton crane that has changed Rio Rancho’s skyline for the next several

months. Superintendent **Rob Ridenour** continues to impress the Sundt team as they offload more of their scope into his capable leadership.

### Intel ASU Sitework

Superintendent **Rob Ridenour** and Foreman **Daryl Morrill** have started a multi-acre site for Air Products inside the ASU yard. The project includes the sitework package for two air separator units, systems that will treat and contain chemicals on site. The project will be very fast paced, with a target of completing the site over-excavation, mass foundations, and underground piping in six months.

## Intel Tips Fire Line

Klinger has begun excavation for the new foam fire suppression line for Intel’s TIPS building. This work will be performed as a third-tier subcontractor under Western states Fire Protection and should wrap up sometime in Q1 2023. This is another of the multiple projects that **Rob Ridenour** and his team accommodate

at the Intel site. Special thanks to Nelson Roop, the Klinger site safety coordinator at Intel.

### Intel Equipment Offloads

As more and more owner-furnished equipment shows up at intel, Klinger has been hired directly by Intel to unload and store these varied pieces of equipment. The equipment generally shows up with little to no notice, so **Rob Ridenour** and his guys have to juggle tasks in order to accommodate unloading these items.

### META (Facebook) Facility Ops

**Juan Payan, Zach Haynes, and Eduardo Zamarripa** continue to support a variety of Meta’s daily electrical operational needs at the multiple VLL datacenters in Los Lunas. With direction from **Byron Gore**, Zach continues to take on further estimating and management duties centered around this unique service Klinger provides to Meta. Work continues at a varied pace in this arena, with September marking four years of continuous service on site. Meta has lined up numerous projects for the Klinger crew, and we expect a higher volume of executed work in the field throughout 2023.

### NMSA Phase 2 Dormitory

The much anticipated New Mexico School for the Arts Dormitory project is underway in Santa Fe. The 19,500 SF dorms are designed to house 60

students from all around New Mexico. **Larry Gastian** and **Miguel Porras** have completed the site demo and Custom Grading has begun over-excavation in preparation for the foundation to begin. The building will be a wood frame two story structure with 30 dorm rooms as well as three rooms for the full time residential assistants. It also includes multiple kitchen / break areas, lounges, practice rooms and a gym for the students. We are slated to be ready for occupancy in late 2023.

### Kirtland Credit Union in Rio Rancho & Los Lunas

While Klinger has done work directly with KCU before, both of these projects are under contract for construction manager New Ground. The projects are strip mall bank branch tenant improvements and are quick-hitters which makes them a challenge in today’s construction environment. **Vicente Ramirez** (Rio Rancho) and **Greg Guillen**

(Los Lunas) are leading Klinger’s effort to complete them on schedule. Jose Hernandez has been doing several small projects while starting the demo at Los Lunas.

### Blue Cross Blue Shield

Our Blue Cross/Blue Shield phase one is 75% completed. **Mario Marquez** and crew did an amazing job getting our steel into the building, and walls/floors/ceilings restored.

Thank you, **Mario** and crew, for doing a tremendous job. Phase two (new RTUs) were delayed due to supply chain issues. We will begin this project the first week of January 2023. We should be completed by the end of March 2023. **Mario** will see this project out until the end!

### Dion’s Commissary

Under the leadership of **Angel Ramirez**, Klinger is in the final stages of completing the Dion’s Commissary. Crews have been faced with several challenges. The existing slab was not adequate to support Dion’s new rack system – thus we replaced 30,000 SF of interior slab. Issues with the specified epoxy

flooring system all contributed challenges to completion.

We have been able to work with Dion's, Architect/Engineers, and subcontractors to provide work arounds on issues as they come up to keep the project moving forward.

Dion's will slowly be moving into the new facility over the holidays, with the full production areas moving in after the first of the year.

Thanks to Klinger's current crew on site – **Jesus Villa** and **Raul Saenz**, along with others that have provided a helping hand as needed. Also thanks to the subcontractors that have worked on this project.

## InnovAge Dental

## Bueno Food Tortilla Room

**Greg Guillen** was selected to work at Bueno Foods for their Tortilla Room upgrades. Working at Bueno Foods is never an easy task, as they are a 24/7

food facility and the scope of work changes constantly. The project consisting of two phases – with new equipment installation, slab and drain repairs, new ceiling grid/tiles, wall finishes, large door installs and electrical upgrades. While working on the main project, Bueno also asked our crews to perform several maintenance projects around the facilities. Helping **Greg** out is **Nick Hidalgo**.

## Dermatology and Skin Cancer Center of New Mexico

**Joe Aguirre** and crews have completed the interior demo and are underway on the build back. Once complete, the project will house both medical practices under one roof with 27 exam/treatment rooms, a shared lab for quick diagnoses of problems, two waiting area/nurse stations, offices for providers, back-of-house business offices, and large meeting/breakroom. The project is scheduled to be complete in late May with a two phase move in early June.

## Akins Manufacturing

Superintendent **Eli Gonzales Sr.** continues to lead the team towards final completion of the new 18,000 SF steel fabrication shop for Akins Manufacturing in Algodones. The building is in finishing stages with the target of bringing Akins’ operation over in early January. The building is twice the size of their current facility, but as it was designed from the ground up for their operation, it will be far more than twice as efficient for steel fabrication. Thank you to the team and to Shawn and Veronica for hiring Klinger for this project. Klinger crews will erect a lot of steel in the future that was built by this team in Algodones.

## Route 66 Legends Theater

It is with great pride and anticipation that Klinger and team return to the Route 66 Casino to perform our fifth structural stabilization project.

Superintendent **Jason Tabbert** is finishing up the pre-mobilization scope to stabilize and relocate major electrical equipment and then mobilizing on the remediation efforts for the Legends Theater. The theater is a 40,000 SF, 3000 seat music and performance venue that has been closed since the start of covid in 2020. With the upcoming stabilization and renovation, the theater will reopen with new seating, lights, and state-of-the-art audio and video capabilities. The complete project will take 18 months.
